



Daisy Outdoor Challenge #3 Overhand Knot

Materials: small length of rope for each girl

Objective: Girls will be able to tie an overhand knot.

Directions:

Activity One (Practice):

1. Use the diagram and teach the basic knot terminology:

- a. Working end end of rope being used to tie the knot
- b. Standing End end of the rope you are not working with
- c. Bight bend in the rope
- d. Loop when one part of the rope is crossed over the other
- 2. Use the pictures and teach how to tie an overhand knot
 - a. Form a loop
 - b. Pass the working end through the loop
 - c. Pull tight
- 3. Practice the knot several times.


Activity Two (Knot Relay):

- Place a rope at one end of the room and have the girls split into at least two groups at the opposite end of the room.
- 2. Explain that when the leader says go, one girl at a time from the group should walk to the other end of the room, pick up the rope and tie an overhand knot.
- 3. After the knot is tied, show the leader for correctness.
- 4. If correct, go back to the end of the line and sit down.
- 5. As the first girl passes the starting line, the second girl may go.
- 6. The first team to all be sitting down wins the race.

Multiple rounds can be completed with different locomotor movements – skipping, leaping, hopping, running, etc.

Overhand Knot

Step One:



Make a loop.

Step Three:




Pull tight.

Step Two:




Pass the working end through the loop.





Working End – end of rope being used to tie the knot

Brownie Outdoor Challenge #3 Square Knot

Materials: small length of rope for each girl plus two extra

Objective: Girls will be able to tie a square knot.

Directions:

Activity One (Practice):

1. Use the diagram and teach the basic knot terminology:

- a. Working end end of rope being used to tie the knot
- b. Standing End end of the rope you are not working with
- c. Bight bend in the rope
- d. Loop when one part of the rope is crossed over the other
- 2. Use the pictures and teach how to tie a square knot
 - a. Hold one end in each hand, cross the rope on the right over the rope on the left
 - b. Continue under the rope on the left
 - c. Now take the rope on your left and cross over the rope on the right
 - d. Continue that end under the rope you just crossed over and pull tight
- 3. Practice the knot several times.

Activity Two (Square Knot Relay):


- Place a rope at one end of the room and have the girls split into at least two groups at the opposite end of the room.
- 2. Give each girl a rope.
- 3. Explain that when the leader says go, one girl at a time from the group should walk to the other end of the room, pick up the rope and tie their rope to it with a square knot.
- 4. After the knot is tied, show the leader for correctness.
- 5. If correct, go back to the end of the line and sit down.
- 6. As the first girl passes the starting line, the second girl may go.
- 7. The first team to all be sitting down wins the race.

Multiple rounds can be completed with different locomotor movements – skipping, leaping, hopping, running, etc.

Square Knot


I always remember "Right over left and around, left over right and around."

Step One:




Hold one end in each hand, cross the rope on the right over the rope on the left.

Step Two:



Continue under the rope on the left.

Step Three:




Now take the rope on your left and cross over the rope on the right.

Step Four:




Continue that end under the rope you just crossed over and pull tight.





Working End – end of rope being used to tie the knot

Junior Outdoor Challenge #3 Clove Hitch

Materials: small length of rope for each girl, pencil for each girl

Objective: Girls will be able to tie a clove hitch.

Directions:

Activity One (Practice):

1. Use the diagram and teach the basic knot terminology:


- a. Working end end of rope being used to tie the knot
- b. Standing End end of the rope you are not working with
- c. Bight bend in the rope
- d. Loop when one part of the rope is crossed over the other
- 2. Use the pictures and teach how to tie clove hitch
 - a. Form an underhand loop
 - b. Form a second underhand loop
 - c. Place the second loop on top of the first loop
 - d. Slide on to pole and pull tight
- 3. Practice the knot several times.

Activity Two (Knot-petition):

- 1. Break the girls into two teams.
- 2. Give each girl on the team a number, starting with one. (Team A should have a number 1 and so should Team B.)
- 3. Either put the numbers in a hat, or just designate a caller (likely a leader).
- 4. Place two ropes and two pencils at the opposite end of the room, but separated and make sure each team knows which rope and pencil is theirs.
- Call a number (either by picking from the hat or the caller just picking a number).
- 6. When the number is called, the girls with that number race to their rope and try to be the first person to correctly tie the clove hitch on the pencil.
- 7. Whichever team wins the round gets a point. Whichever team gets three points first wins! You can play multiple games to make sure that all girls get a chance to go.

Clove Hitch

Step One:



Form an underhand loop.

Step Three:



Place the second loop on top of the first loop.

Step Two:



Form a second underhand loop.


Step Four:



Slide on to pole and pull tight.








Cadette Outdoor Challenge #3 Bowline

Materials: small length of rope for each girl

Objective: Girls will be able to tie a bowline.

Directions:

Activity One (Practice):

1. Use the diagram and teach the basic knot terminology:


- a. Working end end of rope being used to tie the knot
- b. Standing End end of the rope you are not working with
- c. Bight bend in the rope
- d. Loop when one part of the rope is crossed over the other
- 2. Use the pictures and teach how to tie a bowline
 - a. Form an overhand loop
 - b. Pass the working end through the loop
 - c. Pass the working end under the standing end
 - d. Pass the working end back through the original loop and pull tight
- 3. Practice the knot several times.

Activity Two (Knot Entourage):

- 1. Give each girl a rope
- Explain that when the game begins each girl will need to seek out a buddy.
- 3. When the buddies have been found, each girl holds their rope behind their back completely untied and together say "Ready, Set, Knot"
- 4. As soon as "knot" is said, each girl brings their rope to the front and races to tie a bowline. Upon completion the girl should drop the rope to the ground. The first rope to hit the floor with a correctly tied bowline wins.
- 5. Upon winning, the girl who did not win then becomes part of the winner's entourage, cheering her on. The girl and her entourage go to find a new partner.
- 6. Play continues with the new partner, each time the winner gains the girl who does not win and any entourage she may have already obtained.
- 7. Eventually it will end with a head to head competition to determine the bowline champion of your troop!

Step One:




Form an overhand loop.

Pass the working end through the loop.


Step Four:



Pass the working end back through the original loop and pull tight.








Senior Outdoor Challenge #3 Tautline Hitch

Materials: small length of rope for each girl, something to tie around

Objective: Girls will be able to tie a tautline hitch.

Directions:

Activity One (Practice):

- 1. Use the diagram and teach the basic knot terminology:
 - a. Working end end of rope being used to tie the knot
 - b. Standing End end of the rope you are not working with
 - c. Bight bend in the rope
 - d. Loop when one part of the rope is crossed over the other
- 2. Use the pictures and teach how to tie a tautline hitch
 - a. Pass the working end around the pole
 - b. Pass working end under and around standing end
 - c. Create second loop around standing end
 - d. Pass under original loop
 - e. Pass under the standing end and back through the loop just created and pull tight
- 3. Practice the knot several times.

Activity Two (The Need for Speed):

- Give each girl a piece or rope and an object to tie around and sit in a line or circle.
- 2. Explain that when the leader says go, the girls are to tie a tautline hitch as quickly as they can correctly.
- 3. Upon completion the girl should throw her hands up in the air.
- 4. The first girl to correctly complete the hitch wins the round and steps out of the game.
- 5. Play continues with a second round played the same as the first. Each round a new person is eliminated.

Tautline Hitch

Step One:



Pass the working end around the pole.

Step Three:



Create second loop around standing end.

Step Five:



Pass under the standing end and back through the loop just created and pull tight.

Step Two:



Pass working end under and around standing end.


Step Four:



Pass under original loop.








Activity One (Practice):


- 1. Use the diagram and teach the basic knot terminology:
 - a. Working end end of rope being used to tie the knot
 - b. Standing End end of the rope you are not working with
 - c. Bight bend in the rope
 - d. Loop when one part of the rope is crossed over the other
- 2. Use the pictures and teach how to tie a friendship knot
 - a. Wrap one end over and around your fingers
 - b. Pass the working end under the bight and over the standing end
 - c. Pass the working end back under everything
 - d. Pass the working end back over the standing end and through the bight and pull tight
- 3. Practice the knot several times.

Activity Two (Knot Food):

- 1. Give each girl a few licorice strings
- 2. Have her practice tying the friendship knot with licorice strings
- 3. Upon successful completion of the knot, the girl gets to eat her licorice!


Friendship Knot

Step One:



Wrap one end over and around your fingers.

Step Three:



Pass the working end back under everything.

Step Two:



Pass the working end under the bight and over the standing end.


Step Four:



Pass the working end back over the standing end and through the bight and pull tight.







Working End – end of rope being used to tie the knot
